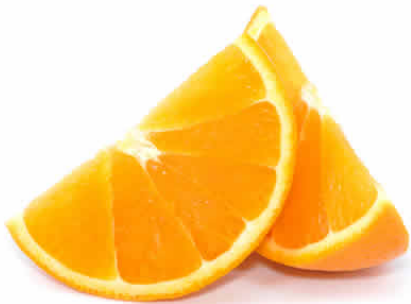

MARKET UPDATE

Beef, Poultry & Dairy

Dairy- July US milk production was .7% more than last year due to a .9% larger milk cow herd and a .1% decline in milk per cow yields. The heat this summer impacted milk production but farmers were still able to add 7,000 head to the herd in July. The CME spot cheese markets finally weakened this past week. CME blocks and barrels lost 15.2% and 19.1% respectively. July US cheese stocks posted the biggest one month gain in 7 years. Although the butter market is steady, the dairy complex looks bearish short-term. Still, elevated feed costs could lead to curbed output in 2012.

Beef- Seasonal price weakness is anticipated for beef during September. Historically, the USDA choice cutout decreases 15% over the next 6 weeks with the NY Strip usually losing 3% in that same time period. Beef trimmings also tend to move lower, but this year's decline may be tempered due to lackluster imports. Forward beef sales are expected to rise for tenderloins and ribeyes in the coming weeks as holiday purchase commitments occur. Poor pasture conditions are still in place for cattle producers and may support cattle prices in '12.

Poultry- The chicken markets have been strong with breasts, wings and legs all moving higher. The recent upward price pressure for chicken comes on the heels of historically depressed prices for breast and wings. Chicken production cutbacks continue to be realized as feed cost remain inflated. In fact, the 6 week moving average for broiler type egg sets is now trending 5.9% lower than last year. Recently, a sizable publicly traded chicken producer announced plans to cut future chicken supplies through February '12 due to disappointing earnings. This could be a sign that chicken production cutbacks could deepen. Higher chicken wing prices are anticipated over the next two months which isn't unusual for this time of year.

Fresh Produce

Oranges: Valencia orange supplies are shorting up on 88's and smaller as demand is exceeding supplies for small fruit with the increased demand with schools beginning.

Grapes: The market on red grapes continues to be steady as availability is good along with demand. Shippers are starting to transition from Flames into Crimson and Scarlet Royal. Most of the fruit is still running large to extra large on all colors. Greens have come on strong with Thompsons and Princess both available. The market is flat. Shippers have good availability on both black seedless and Red Globe.

Lettuce: This market is steady. Weights continue to average 42 to 50 pounds on lettuce, depending on the shipper. The weights throughout the week are expected to be strong. Shippers are still looking to move some big volume so offers are out there to be had. Santa Maria and Salinas are the main growing areas at this time.

Tomatoes: Hurricane Irene has come & gone, and the growers & analysts are left to assess the damage. While the Eastern Shore district in Virginia/Maryland were in a skip of sorts, the key is to determine how much of the fruit due to be picked in mid-September is harvestable. The track of Irene passed directly across the Delmarva Peninsula, which does not bode well for what is left of the crop of rounds, grape & cherry tomatoes. Details to follow Wednesday.

Seafood

Groundfish- The threat of Hurricane Irene forced every boat from the Chesapeake to Nova Scotia into port last weekend. Most of the boats had small volumes of fish. Those fish were sold yesterday and today into the market, any new fish will be from day boats with limited volume and very high prices. Most of the large vessels that are headed out will not return to port until next week. After a large storm passes the fish are usually scattered and it could take a few days before the fleet can find large schools of fish again. Expect low landings and high prices for the next week or longer until the weather improves and the fleet can find fish.

Scallops: The American fleet headed into shore before the Hurricane hit and most of that product was not sold until yesterday and today. The New Bedford auction was closed yesterday. Prices jumped up again as landings were very light and demand has remained strong for frozen orders to Europe. Many large offshore boats are headed back out to the scallop grounds and a few boats will finish their allotted trips in Area 1 and Area 2. It could be a week or longer before any substantial volume of scallops are landed from the offshore fleet. The smaller general category boats will begin to land more volume by next week as well.

Halibut: Landings from Canada dropped off after the last opening in the Canadian Maritimes, although there was a small quantity of good day boat fish available. Landings have dropped off after Hurricane Irene came through the Maritimes, but landings should begin to pick up again by next week. Landings remain very light from Alaskan boats and shore prices have edged up again. With the reduced quota for Alaskan Halibut in 2011 and many boats already finished for the season the remainder of the season should see very limited landings until the October closure.
