Market Update

Halibut- EAST COAST: Landings are extremely limited except for a couple of large offshore hook boats. West coast season closed until March 2012. More boats will head out after this weekend and volume will increase for next week. Extended outlook: Large offshore boats will land fish before Christmas, but landings will be limited as halibut begin to spawn in December.

Swordfish: Canadian boats are finished for this season and most American Long Line boats are chasing fish south along the Gulf Stream. Expect landings to slowly drop off during the winter and not pick up again until the summer. Prices will slowly increase over the winter as supply drops off from the American boats.

Tuna: Landings have been extremely light. Imports from Central America and Indonesia make up the bulk of imported tuna. Pricing will continue to remain high.

Market Update

Beef, Poultry & Dairy

Dairy- The CME Group cash cheese market continued to increase early in the week to reach and/or break the \$2.00 per pound mark. However, prices started to decline on Wednesday and continued to fall to finish the week at \$1.8325 for blocks and \$1.8700 for barrels. The shift from strictly bids to sellers offering product on the CME Group quickly snuffed out the rally. Packagers and processors will operate on a holiday abbreviated schedule next week, reducing bulk cheese requirements. Strong milk demand from bottlers this week, for some operations their largest volume week of the year, reduced the manufacturing milk supply. Butter-The cash butter price at the CME continues to decline and closed the week at \$1.6475, 9 1/4 cents lower than a week ago. The current cash price is the lowest since mid December 2010. Churning schedules across the country remain seasonally active. Cream prices and pricing multiples are trending lower. Many butter producers are anticipating that by early next week, cream offerings will start building as Class II operations reduce production schedules or shutter operations for the Thanksgiving holiday weekend. Cream pricing will often be a determining factor for many butter producers as to how heavy they churn during the holiday period. Overall butter demand this past week was quite active as final Thanksgiving orders were placed and delivered.

Poultry-US chicken exports during Sept were 4% more than last year. Chicken exports to Russia in Sept were the largest since Dec '10 but still more than 50% below their all time peak level. Solid exports may continue to support chicken leg quarter prices. Broiler-type egg sets continue to be curbed with the existing 6 week moving average 7.2% below '10. Chicken production should remain below year ago levels this winter. The chicken breast markets have strengthened in recent days and are anticipated to remain supported through the winter. The chicken wing markets usually remain inflated deep into Jan. Any seasonal wing price declines thereafter may be mitigated by reduced chicken production.

Beef-Cattle placements have been up a total of 4% from a year ago. Thus, it has not been a significant drop in supply that has driven the market to record highs. Rather, it has been a surge in demand, particularly for choice beef that has resulted in significantly elevated pricing. The report insinuates that we will not see any significant year-over-year declines in cattle supplies (barring weather of course) until at least March/April. However, with Walmart continuing to implement an upper choice beef program, and continued strong demand abroad, cash cattle prices in Q2 of 2012 are likely to exceed their recent record highs.

Fresh Produce

Squash-The squash market remains soft as Georgia cleans up and Florida starts producing decent volume. However, a cooling trend across Florida could slow down production, keeping the market from getting much lower. Quality has been decent and demand is good.

Potatoes- The Idaho potato market is flat on all sizes. Most shippers are still packing more of the larger potatoes while the smaller counts remain limited. The tightest item right now is transportation! Washington's market is also steady on all sizes and they continue to peak on 60's and 70's while 80's and smaller are short. Colorado is very limited on all cartons right now because most shippers have big potatoes and are putting them in their consumer bags. Bakersfield, California continues shipping colored potatoes and all sizes are available. Washington & North Dakota both continue packing reds and gold's. Both areas are heavier to A size and then B's but is short on premiums. Wisconsin continues packing reds, whites, and golds and supplies are good. Idaho continues packing reds and golds as well and they are also peaking on A-size. Quality has been excellent in Washington while Wisconsin and North Dakota has ranged from excellent to fair.

Grapes-The market on red grapes continues to be steady as availability is still good along with light demand. The market will start to tighten up over the next couple of weeks as we are on the down swing of production in central California. Off shore Chilean grapes should get going off the East Coast at the beginning of next month with the West Coast coming on shortly after. Green grapes are finishing up quickly in the central valley quality is marginal at best. There are Brazilian Festivals available at a premium price off the East Coast and a few available now on the west coast as well. Very good quality on the Brazilian product. Shippers have good availability on Black Seedless and limited on Red Globe availability.
