# MARKET UPDATE

## Beef, Poultry & Dairy

**Dairy**– The CME cheese markets bounced this week after experiencing a significant price decline last week. The milk markets also found support after losing value recently. Better milk supplies are being reported in part due to cooler temperatures in the Midwest and East. New Zealand milk production is expected to be healthy this year with positive pasture conditions being reported. Steady to lower dairy prices are expected this fall. One challenge dairy farmers face going forward however, is higher feed costs. Dairy cow expansion plans could fade in 2012 as a result.

**Beef**– Beef output last week decreased 1.6% but was .4% larger than the same week a year ago. The US economy is being challenged again. If the US economy falters, beef demand could weaken as a result. Still, severe drought conditions persist in the Southwest. Livestock cattle farmers face tough pasture conditions and hay supplies are limited. This is bearish for future beef supplies and could elevate beef prices significantly in '12. The direction of the US dollar will also be key for future beef prices especially for lean beef trimmings. A weak US dollar would discourage beef trimming imports.

**Poultry**– Most chicken markets remain strong. Chicken production rates continue to decline due to poor profit margins for producers. Chicken prices have moved higher in response over the last several weeks. Inflated feed costs remain a challenge for chicken producers. Unfortunately, grain supplies are expected to be tight into 2012 which should mitigate chicken production. The chicken breast markets usually fade during the fall but chicken wing prices tend to remain firm. However, this year's seasonal weakness in breast prices may be tempered. Demand for chicken leg quarters could remain solid especially if the US dollar is deflated.

## Fresh Produce

**Asparagus**– This market is firm on all sizes. Supplies continue to be light coming from Peru and although production has picked up in Mexico, overall supplies are still light in the market. Standard sizing continues to be the most readily available. Continue to place orders on this commodity early all this week.

**Strawberries**: The market continues to firm but steady the start of the this week. It looks like we are going to be in a very tight supply situation on Strawberries for the next month or so. We are into typical end of summer fruit shipping out of the Salinas/Watsonville growing areas. The strawberry plants are very tired and do not have the strength to compensate for adverse weather the Northern growing districts have been receiving this last month. Smaller fruit size, and the seasonal drop off of the harvest numbers out of the Salinas/Watsonville growing areas is contributing to the lesser supply. Harvest numbers are dropping weekly and will continue to drop till the first major winter storm hits which will put this growing area out of the picture. Even the best of shippers are coming up short and having to fill rate orders as well as push back loading dates to accommodate the demand. Currently quality of the strawberries is fair out of all areas. Issues to be aware of are bruising, over ripe, soft, decay and mold. Strawberries are just tired so only order what you need. Shippers are getting selective on where they are going with their fruit at this time and are keeping their fruit with customers that understand the condition of the fruit. Make sure your trucks are running 33 to 34 degrees to keep the fruit cool as possible. Any type of temperature swing will weaken the fruit quicker. Stem strawberries are very limited and the ones that are being packed are for the most part are strawberry with a long stem.

**Eastern Squash**: Georgia has started with a few zucchini and yellow squash. Michigan and New York continue to ship as well. Quality has been good. Some rain in New York may curtail picking for a few days. Demand is still good and supplies have been consistent when weather has not been an issue. North Carolina should start by next week

## Seafood

**Groundfish**– The clean up from hurricane Irene is continuing from the Carolinas to New England. With more inclement weather expected from tropical storm Lee, followed by tropical force winds from Hurricane Katia, every fishing boat from the Carolinas to the Canadian Maritimes will be heading into port. Landings have been light since last week and prices have bumped up for all species of fish. Assuming the weather predictions are correct every boat in the northeast will be tied up by weeks end creating a shortage for the weekend and into next week. I expect prices to continue to rise until after the boats can cycle back out again and get a few days of fishing completed.

**Scallops**– Most of the American Fleet that was fishing after hurricane Irene has returned to port, landings were heavy, but prices have jumped up again on all sizes of fresh scallops. Many boats are finishing their allotted days at sea early this year and only a few boats have any trips remaining into Area 1 and Area 2. Prices for U/10's dropped in August, but now any new scallops landed are fetching higher prices and I expect pricing to continue to rise as landings fall off later this fall. With two storm fronts approaching this week every scallop boat in New England and Canada will be heading back to port. Landings will drop off as the boats head into the port and by next week landings will be minimal.

**Shellfish**– Hurricane Irene created some shortages for shellfish after the storm passed. Many harvesting areas were closed due to run off, or abnormal tide and flooding. Now that harvesting is returning to normal the two storms I mentioned earlier will bring heavy rains and winds to coastal areas where shellfish are harvested. There could be more closures due to flooding and runoff. Expect high prices and shortages by the beginning of next week after the two storms pass.
